I wiggle my tail and dive right in!

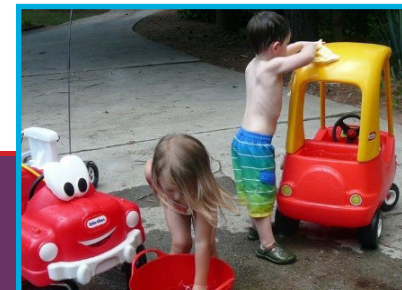
## Five Little Ducks

And all five little ducks came waddling back!  
(Hold up 5 fingers and move hand in a waddling motion.)
